For the past few years now I have been involved at our Outreach center to drive our ministry Van for the elderly. To be a listening ear to hear some of their stories is fascinating.


This is my second season with our *Faith sharing group* in which we gather and share the upcoming Readings of the week.

CALL TO EVANGELIZE

November begins with the celebration of All Saints Day-that "great cloud of witnesses" (Heb 12:1) who encourage us to keep our eyes on the prize: *life with God forever in Heaven*.



Then, the rest of the month, Mother Church asks us to pray for our dearly departed brothers and sisters, souls on their sure way to joining the Saints in Heaven.

These "Holy Souls," as the Church calls them, are those for whom the Heavenly prize is

marvelously guaranteed (since they died in God's friendship), but not yet in hand (since their souls are not ready --not wholly cleaned from the effects of their sins; not "holy" enough to be in His Awesome Presence). Thus, these friends of God are in that cleansing place we call Purgatory.

As members of the Communion-of-Saints, it is our stewardship privilege and responsibility, while we still are on Earth, to join the Saints in Heaven in praying for souls in this in-between place, for love of God-- and in God, for love of self and neighbor. Although these souls cannot pray for themselves, they can and do pray for us, now. And--please, God--when our souls are in Purgatory, getting all cleaned up, they will be praying to speed up our entrance into the Holy Presence of God, heartily cheering on, too, our joyous One-Family-in-Mission reunion!
